

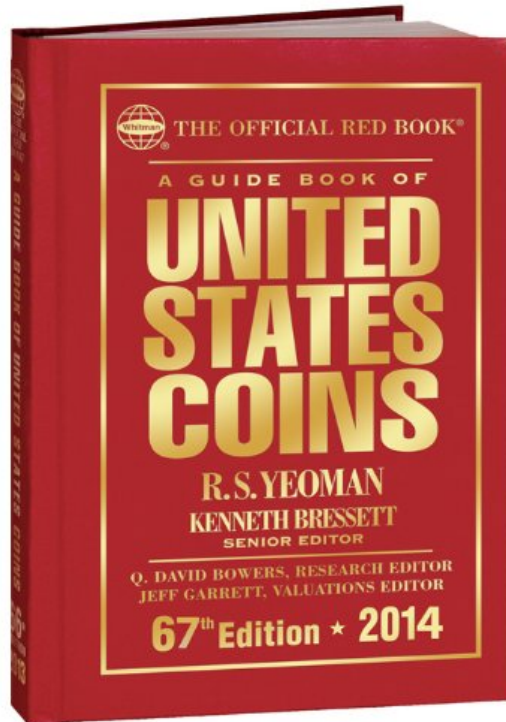

Get the book for the photos and information --- not for the prices.By Eric the KFor over 65 years, the "Red Book" has been the standard reference for coin collectors. It is loaded with information on just about every imaginable United States coin type --- regular issues, proofs, commemoratives, never-used pattern pieces, tokens and mint errors --- that has been used or produced in America since Colonial times. (There is even a section on the collectible value of previous editions of the Red Book itself.) The prices shown for each coin are a helpful guideline to knowing the relative retail costs at one point in time but to try to apply the given values to a current and dynamic market would be like using a January edition of the Wall Street Journal in September to determine what stocks are worth. To fault this book for its lack of currency (no pun intended) would be to entirely miss the point of its value. Yes, you can search for, and find, much of this same information on the Internet with prices that are more up-to-date. However, you cannot

find anywhere else such a singular reference with information so conveniently assembled in one place. For novices, it is a wondrous introduction to the variety and history of American coinage; for intermediate collectors, it is a wish list to help choose future acquisitions; and for advanced collectors, it is a reminder that the Mint once produced coins whose artistry in design make them well worth collecting. It is a marvel for any coin collector to flip through and reconnect with what brought them to the hobby in the first place.

If you are just getting started in coin collecting, or are an experienced collector and need a little help on an obscure specimen, the Guidebook can give you all the information you will need. If you are a very experienced collector with a very extensive collection or a long-time collector with a very narrow focus, you probably know all the information in this book with respect to your specialties. It is a useful source. I buy this every few years and learn something new with every purchase (I do not buy every year because I am not as active in the market as I once was). Because the coin market is a dynamic market, and the pricing information in the guidebook had to be gathered some time before printing, it is, by definition, dated (although not badly). It is a useful starting point and I rarely buy or sell coins without at least briefly looking at the entry for the coins in question.
