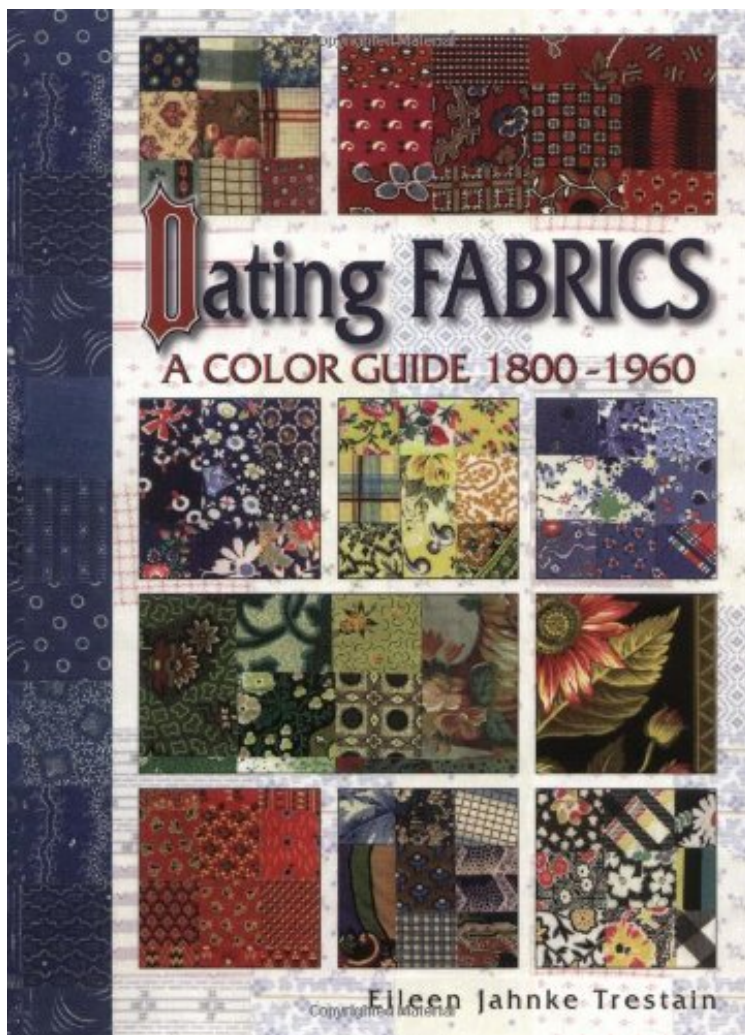

I had several quilts that I knew were before the feed sack era, and I was able to look up similar fabrics and date them . The book not only shows you samples of fabric (pages and pages) but also gives you a wealth of information on the history and process of why certain colors were used, and from what country they were imported from. Learning about where some of the fabrics were originally produced is a story in itself, and the author does a great job pulling it all together.If you are trying to date your vintage quilt, and find out about it's history...this is the book for you. The vintage quilts were hardly ever dated, so this is a

wonderful reference book that you can carry around.
