

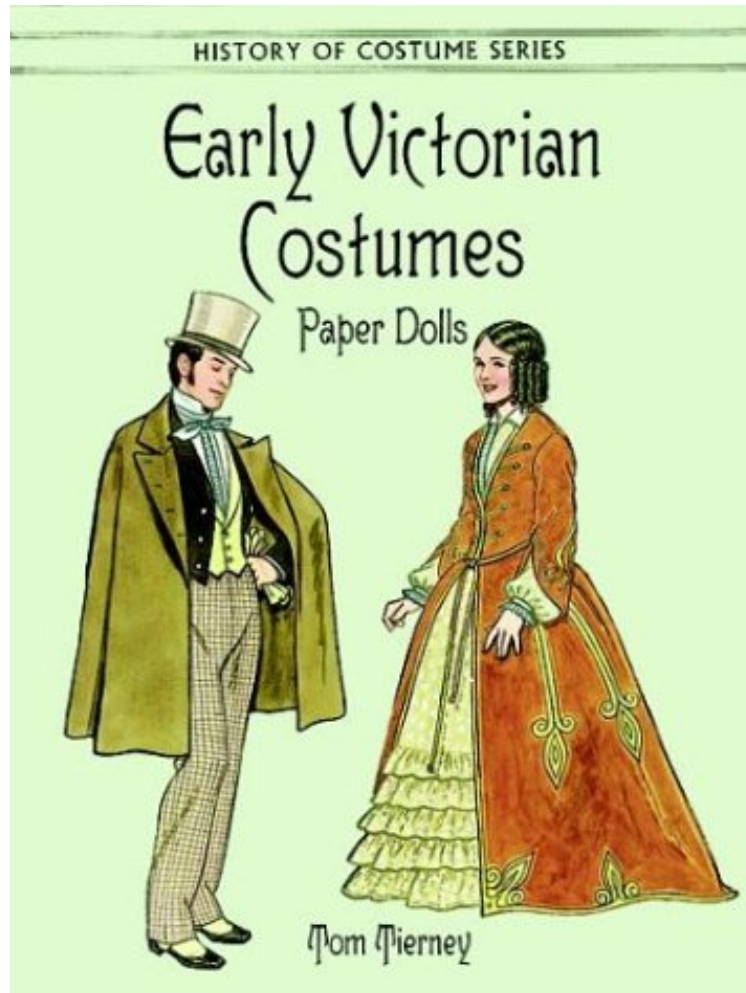

The beginning of an eraBy ChrijeffUnfortunately out of print, this is the first in Tom Tierney's History of Costume series to locate itself entirely in the eventful 19th Century. It begins, somewhat incongruously, with clothing of 1832-3, several years before Victoria took the throne, and carries on through 1860 with tailcoats and frocks, loose trousers, high collars and stocks for men, bell-shaped skirts, flounces, "spaniel" curls, flaring sleeves, parasols, fantastic bonnets, and lace for women. The dolls are provided with clothing for formal and day wear, sport and relaxation. As always, the liner notes are detailed and useful.

Captivating, well-researched collection featuring the stylish wardrobe of a wealthy Victorian-era couple (1837-1860) features 16 costumes that include capes, cloaks and two-piece suits for the gentleman, and modest day dresses, elegant-off-the-shoulder evening wear, and a lovely long-sleeved wedding gown for the lady.
