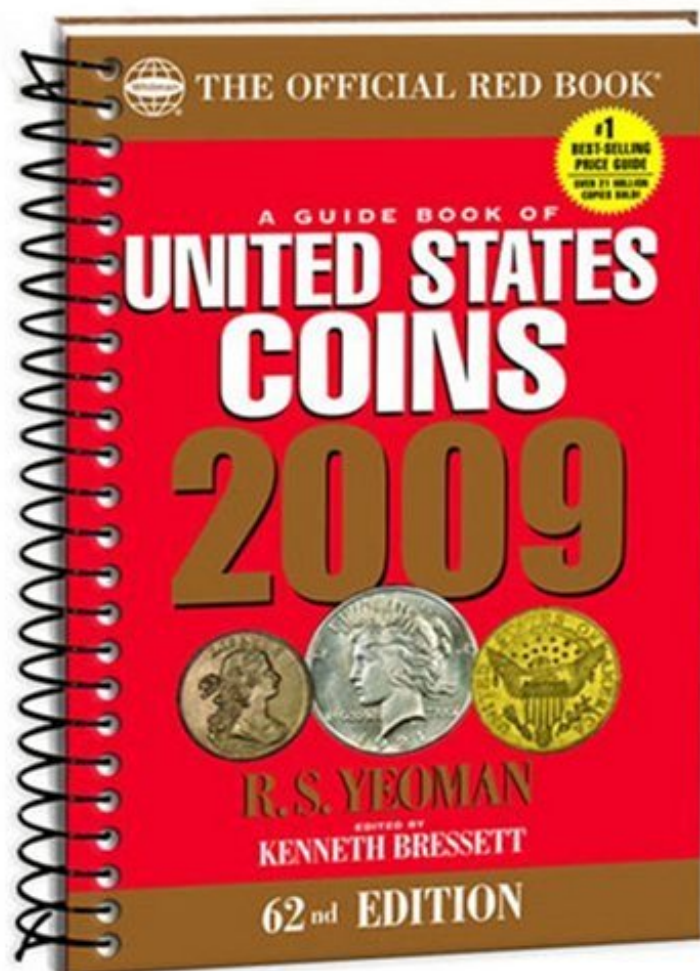

bring to the reader beyond the blue book from the same publisher. Blue book states wholesale prices but redbook
states retail prices. Problem is, retail prices are all over the place, whereas, wholesale prices are more empirically
verifiable. Moreover, wholesale prices are more useful since they state both what a seller of coins may expect to
receive, but also, an indicator of what a dealer may have paid or may perceive to be their bottom line.Hence, I would
