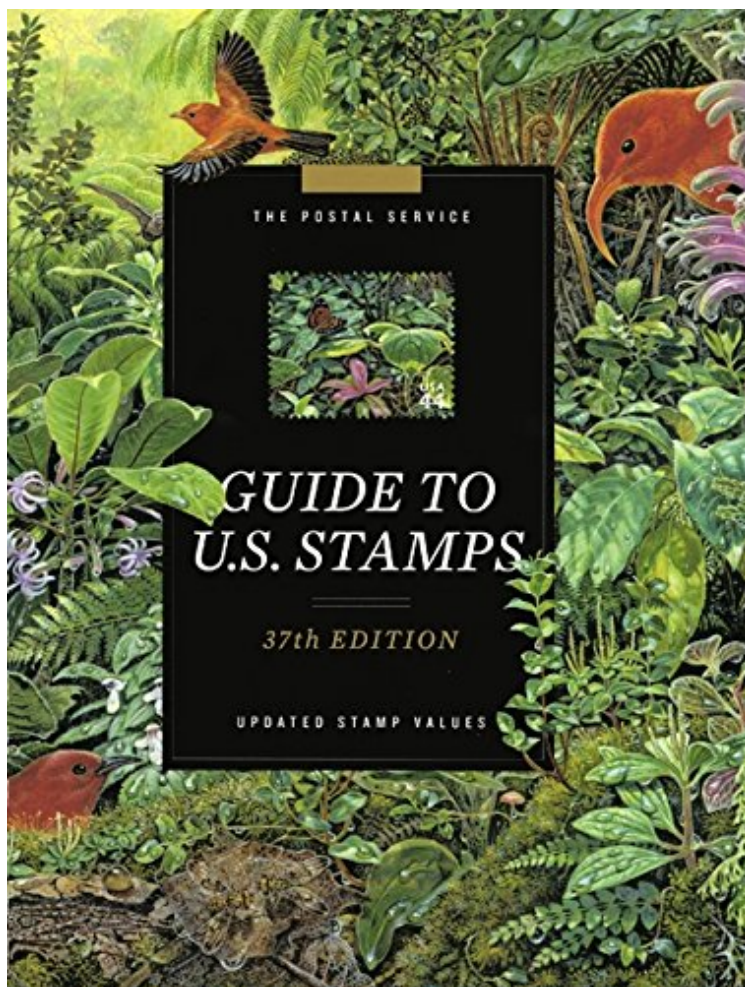

It has pricing in it of various versions and usages of the stamps including First Day covers and various odd issues. It has good photos and good descriptions but it takes a little while to get to understand all of their descriptive aspects.
